Get to know our Board Members: Marlene Blume, Treasurer

A member of the Fitler Square Improvement Association for over 40 years, Marlene Blume has seen Fitler Square evolve into the charming and welcoming site it is today.

An original "Working Girl," she first moved to the neighborhood in 1963 where she lived with two roommates at 2515 Waverly Street. The Fitler Square Improvement Association was just beginning to develop the park at that time, and there was no grass, no fence, and a lonely cement turtle.

In 1965, she and her roommates moved to 400 South 24th Street, and her next-door neighbor, long-time FSIA Board member and former president, Connie Williams, recruited Marlene to bake goodies for the Bake Booth and become more involved in the park. In 1965 another important event in Marlene's life occurred; she met her husband Joe Blume at a New Year's Eve party at a friend's apartment above the Oliver Bair funeral parlor. At the time Joe lived at 2317 Delancey Street. They were married in 1969 and moved to their picturesque house on the 400 block of Croskey Street.

A member of FSIA since 1970, she has been Treasurer for 25 years, keeping track of our expenses and income, a daunting task that her fellow Board members

will "not permit" her to retire from. While tirelessly volunteering on the Board during this time, and prior, from 1955 until 1999, she also worked full time in virus research, first at Children's Hospital and then at Wyeth Laboratories, retiring from there in 1999.

Marlene has had many duties at the Fair, but she always seems to end up at the Food Booth, most likely due to her great cooking. When asked what is the one Fair that stands out in your mind, she replied "last year's, because we had two FULL days of sunshine."

When asked what is your favorite thing about Fitler Square, she responded "what I enjoy most is when I walk by and see people enjoying themselves in the park." She was also asked what her favorite thing about the neighborhood is, and she replied "My street and my neighbors. I call it a village."

Look for Marlene at the Fair this year, where she will be once again our chief cook, along with Pat Henningsen. at the Food Booth.

Constance Williams 1935 - 2014



Connie truly loved Fitler Square. She lived across from it for many years. It was her front yard and she treated it that way. Connie was on the Broad of Directors of the Improvement Association since the total redo of the Square in the early 1960s and was presi-

dent during the '80s and 90's. She was particularly fond of the turtle sculpture which she helped create and install. She could actually see them from her window.

After growing up in Moorestown, New Jersey, graduating from high school there and going on to Centenary College, she found her lifelong neighborhood here. For years she was a member of the vestry at Holy Trinity on Rittenhouse Square and later attended Saint Mark's Episcopal Church. Her business resume included manager of the Philadelphia Ramblers, a minor league ice hockey team, acting secretary of the Liberty Bowl football team as well as secretary of CCRA and active in the management of the Civil War Museum on Pine Street.

She was a delightful and dedicated part of the Fitler Square family. Everyone's friend and always there when needed. In her final two years she resided at Watermark on Logan Square and in late November was relocated to Annapolis nearer to relatives, where she died on December 6, 2014 of complications from dementia and Parkinson's disease.


